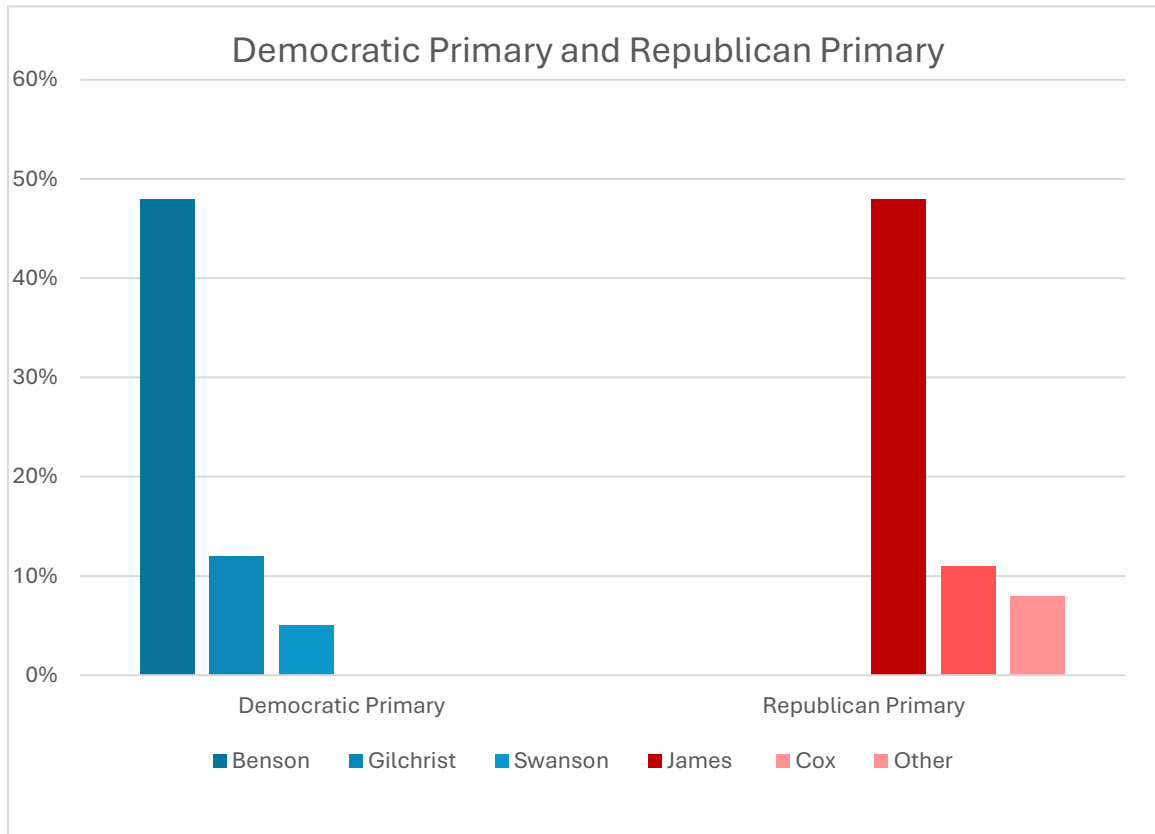

Benson-James Top Candidates for Governor

LANSING, Mich. —Secretary of State Jocelyn Benson is the top Democratic candidate for Governor of Michigan on the Democratic ticket, while Congressman John James is the top candidate in the Republican Party Primary for governor according to the latest Mitchell-MIRS Michigan Poll.

The survey of N=616 November General Election voters, N=261 Likely Democratic Primary voters and N=255 Likely Republican Primary voters, was commissioned by MIRS and conducted by Mitchell Research & Communications November 18-21, 2025, using SMS-Web methodology where text messages are sent to cellphones directing respondents to a SurveyMonkey poll and online panels.

The survey was conducted by **Mitchell Research & Communications, Inc.** and sponsored by **Michigan Information & Research Service, Inc. (MIRS)**. Mitchell Research was ranked the 13th most accurate pollster out of 136 in America by **ActiVote**. Mitchell was rated more accurate than the New York Times, Washington Post, ABC News, CNN, all other Michigan pollsters.

In the race for the Republican nomination for governor, John James (48%) was in the lead, with former Attorney General Mike Cox (11%) in 2nd place. Following up the field in the GOP Primary were former MI Speaker of the House Tom Leonard (5%), Michigan State Senate Minority Leader Aric Nesbitt (2%), Ralph Rebrandt (1%), with (33%) still undecided.

In the Democrat Gubernatorial Primary, Benson (48%) has a strong lead over Lt. Gov. Garlin Gilchrist (12%), and Genesee County Sheriff Chris Swanson (5%).

In the General Election, James (37%) leads Benson (31%) by six percent with Duggan (18%) in 3rd place and 14% undecided.

Benson (33%) leads Cox (32%) by one percent with Duggan (19%) in 3rd place and 16% undecided.

Benson (32%) leads Nesbitt (27%) by five percent with Duggan (22%) in 3rd place and 19% undecided.

At this time the three top Republicans in the GOP primary are either leading or trailing closely with Democratic front runner Jocelyn Benson. As we look toward the important 2026 elections, it looks at this time that the Republicans have two strong candidates to run against Benson.

“John James, who lost two US Senate races before being elected and re-elected to Congress in 2022/24, and Mike Cox who lost a race for governor in 2010, are now the leading GOP candidates for governor next year. However, Mike Cox, Aric Nesbitt and Tom Leonard are raising money and intend to be very competitive. It’s too early to count out anyone, although James is clearly in the driver’s seat,” Steve Mitchell, president of Mitchell Research & Communications said.

Mayor Mike Duggan, who is running as an independent candidate, is getting about 20% of the vote in all three scenarios. At this time, Duggan seems to be doing slightly better with Democrats than with Republicans. Duggan does four percent better with Democrats (15%) than Republicans (11%) against Cox, and six percent better against James.

Generic Congressional Ballot Question

The close battle we see in the governor race is consistent with the Generic Congressional Ballot Question where Democrats (45%) lead Republicans (43%) by two percent.

Trump Job Approval/Name ID

Although President Trump is slightly underwater in his job approval, almost half (47%) approve of the job he’s doing while a little over half (51%) disapprove.

Whitmer Job Approval/Name ID

Governor Gretchan Whitmer has a strong job approval (55%) with a majority of voters who say they either “strongly approve” (37%) or “somewhat approve” (18%) of the job she’s doing. Less than half (43%) either “somewhat disapprove” (11%) or “strongly disapprove” (32%) of the job she’s doing.

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Most Important Issue

When asked “what is the single most important issue facing the State of Michigan that will have the most impact on [their] vote for governor, “Economy/inflation” was cited by 36% of the voters. Only other issues to reach double digits were “threats to democracy” (16%), “crime/policing” (10%), and “healthcare” (10%). Other issues were “climate change/environment” (6%), “abortion” (6%), “roads/traffic” (5%), and 5% undecided.

US Senate Race

In the Democrat Party Primary for US Senator there is a very close with Haley Stevens (27%) holding a narrow lead, within the margin of error of the poll, over Mallory McMorrow (24%) with Abdul El-Sayed (16%) a close third, while 33% are undecided.

In General Election tests, Republican Mike Rogers has a slim lead over all three Democrats.

Methodology

The poll was conducted Tuesday, November 18-21, 2025. Two-thirds of the poll (68%) was conducted by text messaging a randomly selected list of registered voter's cell phones and directing them to a SurveyMonkey poll (MMS-Web). About a third (32%) were collected online. The Margin of Error for N=616 General Election voters is 3.7%; N=261 Democratic Primary voters is 6.062%. and N=255 GOP Primary voters is 6.13% all, at the 95% level of confidence. The questionnaire included a number of different Primary and General Election matchups.

It is important to remember that subsets based on demographics, such as gender, age, education, race/ethnicity, 2022 governor outcome, and 2024 president outcome in Michigan, carry with them higher credibility intervals, as the sample size is reduced.

Survey results should be understood within the poll's range of scores and know with a confidence interval of 95% a poll will fall outside the range of scores 1 in 20 times.
